State of New York
Madison County, on this 7th day of October
1834. personally appeared in open Court before the
Judge of the Court of Common Pleas of said County of
Madison now sitting Isabod Woodworth a resident
of the town of Ferris in said County aged sixty Eight
years on the second day of Decr last past who being first
duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the
following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the
act of Congress passed June 7 1832 - That he entered the
service of the United States under the following name offi-
cer & served as follows -

That in the fall of the year 1780 applicant
entered the service of the United States as a volunteer at
the town of Lebanon in the State of Connecticut in a Company
of Militia commanded by Capt. Thompson. Said
Company was attached to the 1st Regiment of the
Connecticut Militia commanded by Genl. Mifflin & in Col. Meade's
Regiment - We were marched from Lebanon to
Stamford or Horse Neck & remained there on duty
until he was verbally discharged by his Captain &
according to the best of his recollection he was gone from
there & was in the Service at this time three months.

In the Spring of the year 1781 at the town of Lebanon
applicant entered into the service of the United
States for one year in Capt. James Dana's Company 1st Regt
of the Connecticut Militia & Genl. Waterbury's Brigade -
The Regiment was divided into two Battalions & the
one Battalion was commanded by said Thos. Dana &
the other by Maj. Henry Price - We marched from
Lebanon to Stamford & Horse Neck & were after wards
at Frog Point & was engaged in skirmishes at that place
at two different periods - That for several weeks the
Company lay at White Plains & from thence they removed
into the vicinity of Stamford & were there - That
at the expiration of his year service the whole corps were

marched into the town of Stamford & were then orally
discharged on maps by Genl Waterbury - Applicant
served his full term of enlistment for one year - He has
no documentary evidence of his service & he knows of no
person except those whose testimony he has procured, whose
testimony he can procure to his service - He hereby abjures
every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present
& declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the agency
of any State - To the first Interrogatory presented by the
War Department & propounded by said Court he answered
that he was born in Lebanon Windsor County (Conn) on the
second day of Jan 1786 - To the second Interrogatory he
answered that he has a Record of his age in his possession in his
family bible & also a Record of his age may be found
in the town of Lebanon aforesaid - To the third Interrogatory
he answered that he was living in Lebanon aforesaid when he was
collected into the service & since the revolutionary war he has
been in Spencer town Columbia County N.Y. & in the towns
of Lenox & Fenner in Madison County N.Y. & that he now
lives in Fenner, which town was formerly a part of Southfield
in Madison County N.Y. To the fourth Interrogatory he
answered that he volunteered when the first notice the Service
& the second time he enlisted - To the fifth Interrogatory
he answered that in addition to the officers under whose
he served & what are mentioned above, he recollects that
he was acquainted with Maj Humphrey, Adj^t Bull Capt
Granger Capt Edwards who were in the service at the
time applicant was - To the sixth Interrogatory he
answered that he never received any written discharge from
the Service - To the seventh Interrogatory he answered by
stating the names of Nicholas Wentworth John G. Curtis
Peter Petrie John Whetman Simon Mason
His Service was all performed as a Private -

ment that the above named applicant was a revolutionary soldier & served as

Huntington & John G. Curtis who have signed the preceding certificate are
residents of the town of Smithfield & said county of Madison, which said town
is adjoining to the town of Framer the place of residence of said applicant, & that
they are credible persons & that their statement is entitled to credit -

fourth day of November 1879 before me the
subscriber one of the Judges of the Court of
Common Pleas in & for the said County of
Madison personally appears Schabod Wood-
worth of Smithfield in said County,
aged Fifty Three Years & upwards, who
being by me first duly sworn according
to Law doth on his oath make the follow-
ing declaration in order to obtain the benefit
now made by the late act of Congress entitled
"An act to provide for certain persons engaged
in the land and naval service of the United
States in the Revolutionary War" That he
the said Schabod Woodworth at Lebanon
in Connecticut about the month of March or
April 1781 he enlisted for one Year into
Captain James Sear's company in Major
Shipman's Regiment in General Waterbury's
Brigade That he continued to serve in the
said corps or in the service of the United
States until the expiration of his period of
enlistment That he first joined the Brig-
ade between Stamford & Horse Neck was
afterward at Frog Point engaged in a
skirmish at that place at two different
periods That for several weeks the corps
lay at White Plains That they removed
thence into the vicinity of Stamford
wintered there That at the expiration
of his term of service the corps was march-
ed into the town of ~~Stamford~~ ^{Stamford} and was

these discharged are made by General Waterbury orally, without giving any written discharge.

This Deponent further faith that he is in reduced circumstances, and stands in need of the assistance of his country, for support. There is no other evidence of his said services on his power.
