the following declaration in order to obtain the  
benefits of the provisions made by the act of Congress  
passed the twenty ninth of July Eighteen hundred and forty eight  
That she is the widow of Joseph Woodworth who  
a private soldier in the War of the revolution and  
as she is informed and truly believes of the Continental  
lines as will appear by the Pension papers of her said  
deceased husband on file in the Pension office at  
Washington by virtue of which he was placed on the pension  
roll and drew a pension up to the day of his death  
she further declares on her oath of affidavit that she  
~~was married~~ <sup>was married</sup> to the said Joseph Woodworth on the eighth  
day of February in the year seventeen hundred and ninety  
nine that her husband the said Joseph Woodworth  
died on May the twenty first eighteen hundred  
and forty one that she was not married to him prior to  
his being in the service but the marriage took place  
at Seneca County New York by Edwin Corner Burroch  
previously to the second day of January eighteen  
hundred and ninety one at the time above stated  
she further swears that she is now a widow  
the widow of the said Joseph Woodworth and that  
she has never before made application for a pension  
she further states on her oath of affidavit that she  
has no documentary evidence in support of the  
said claim for pension nor does she know that  
there are any such in existence except the papers in

the person open at Washington and that she  
knows of no public or private means of her said  
marriage with the said Deborah Joseph  
Woodworth she further declares that J. H. McArthur  
of Washington City is lawfully empowered to present  
his application for a petition with full power of  
substitution

On this 25<sup>th</sup> day of April 1818, before me the subscriber, one of the Judges of the Court of Common Pleas, of the County and State aforesaid said district, personally appeared Joseph Woodworth aged sixty years, resident in Smithfield in the said County, who being by me first duly sworn, according to law, doth, on his oath, make the following declaration, in order to obtain the provision made by the late act of Congress, entitled "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war." That he, the said Joseph enlisted in Lebanon in the state of Connecticut in the company commanded by Captain Dyer of the the Connecticut line in Colonel Duffee's Regiment, as a private about the first of January 1776; that he continued to serve in the said corps, or in the service of the United States until the month of January 1777, when he was discharged from service in the Delaware River state of Pennsylvania, that he was in the battles of Trenton, taking the Hessian's at Haerlem near New York

and that he is in reduced circumstances, and stands in need of the assistance of his country for support; and that he has no other evidence now in his power of his said services.

I, John Stocking Judge, &c. as aforesaid, do certify, that it appears to my satisfaction, that the said Joseph Woodworth did serve in the revolutionary war, as stated in the preceding declaration, against the common enemy, for the term of nine months, on the continental establishment; and I now transmit the proceedings and testimony taken and had before me, to the Secretary for the Department of War, pursuant to the directions of the aforementioned act of Congress.

On this 20 day of June 1820 personally appeared in open court, being a court of record for the said county (created as such by the laws of the state of New-York) Joseph Woodworth aged 62 years, resident in the said county, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath declare, that he served in the revolutionary war, as follows:—In Colonel Duke's regiment, in captain Dyer's company in the Connecticut line, according to the original declaration of this declarant, bearing date the 25 day of April 1815 and that he is now a pensioner and holds a pension certificate from the war department of the United States, numbered 3153 and bearing date on the 30 day of September 1815 and I do solemnly swear, that I was a resident citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March 1818, and that I have not since that time, by gift, sale, or in any manner disposed of my property, or any part thereof, with intent thereby so to diminish it, as to bring myself within the provisions of an act of Congress entitled "an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war," passed on the 18th day of March 1818:—and that I have not, nor has any person in trust for me, any property or securities, contracts or debts due to me, nor have I any income, other than what is contained in the schedule hereunto annexed and by me subscribed."

Dear Madam:

Reference is made to your letter in which you request the Revolutionary War record of Joseph Woodworth, a pensioner of New York in 1818.

The data which follow are found in the papers on file in pension claim, W. 6584, based upon service in the Revolutionary War of Joseph Woodworth.

Joseph Woodworth enlisted in Lebanon, Connecticut, January 1, 1776 and served one year as private in Captain Thomas Dyer's company, Colonel John Durkee's Connecticut regiment, during which he was in the battle of Trenton, taking of the Hessians and battle of Harlem.

He was allowed pension on his application executed April 25, 1818, at which time he resided in Smithfield, Madison County, New York. The soldier gave his age then as sixty years, but did not state the date and place of his birth, nor the names of his parents.

In 1820, the children of Joseph Woodworth who were living at home then were-Hilton, aged sixteen years, Polly, aged fourteen years, Jefferson, aged thirteen years, Madison, aged eleven years, Emeline and Carolina, twins, aged nine years, Joseph, aged seven years, and Diana, aged two years.

Joseph Woodworth died May 21, 1841 in Conewango, Cattaraugus County, New York.

The soldier married February 8, 1799, in Dutchess County, New York, Wayty Cause or Cause.

Wayty Woodworth, the soldier's widow, was allowed pension on her



application executed February 13, 1851, at which time she was aged seventy-nine years. The date and place of her birth and the names of her parents are not shown. She resided in 1851 in Napoli, Cattaraugus County, New York. She died July 5, 1852.

In 1851, Joseph Woodworth, Jr. and Hilton Woodworth, resided in Cattaraugus County, New York, and were present when their mother, Waxy Woodworth, made application for her pension.

There are no further data pertaining to the family of this pensioner, Joseph Woodworth.
